



OUR MISSION IS TO GROW IN FAITH, TO WORSHIP GOD, TO SERVE OTHERS, AND TO WELCOME ALL.




NATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER - THURSDAY MAY 2, AT 7 P.M. AT WESLEY UMC

RENEWING ST. PAUL'S RENOVATION PROJECT

As I approached the rear entrance of the church for a meeting one evening in April, I saw orange temporary fencing surrounding part of the grassy area on the side of the church. To my left I could see the construction equipment occupying space in the parking lot. As I approached the door, I was greeted by cones indicating I needed to be careful where I walked. I thought, isn't the mess wonderful!

It was a blessing to see so many people stay after the 10:30 a.m. Easter Service on March 31 to officially kick off the Renewing St. Paul's renovation project. We ceremonially used golden shovels to make the first digs in the earth. But that of course was not going to get us very far. Seeing the

equipment and the upturned dirt and the orange barriers means that we are on our way to Renewing St. Paul's.

A week or so later, I came back to the church for another meeting. The path of the new sidewalk had been laid, and some of the concrete poured. I could see the area of a small ramp to facilitate accessibility in the church. I started to wonder how the stairwells would look after the repairs. I pondered how the church staff and Property and Grounds Committee might feel after the drainage is fixed and they don't have to worry about potential damage after a heavy rain. I imagined new windows and railings brightening the church interior. I pictured the happy faces of the Loaves and Fishes volunteers placing grocery bags on the elevator from Fellowship Hall to the street level, saving them from the strain of carrying 500 bags up the stairs.

As the staff and many volunteers helping with the recent church cleanup project know, the mess can be the first sign that something wonderful will emerge. I am ecstatic that we are in the mess. "Let Us Rise Up and Build" (Nehemia 2:18), because in so doing the beauty of St. Paul's will once again be on display for all to see.

ST. PAUL'S COUNCIL MEETING APRIL 9, 2024

Because of the timing of the newsletter publication, these newsletter minutes are not the official, approved minutes. After the minutes have been approved at the next meeting, the final minutes are available upon request.

In Attendance: Dietmar Plajer, Sigrid Plajer as Communications Coordinator, Linda Turner as Treasurer, Randy Tanner, Joanne Lauer, John Fischer, Allen Wetzel, Kimmie Burkhart, Jon Stante, and Malcolm Derk.

Excused: Ellen Miller, Carol Miller, Lisa Krex, and Jacob Koch.

Minutes of February Meeting: The March meeting minutes were approved as submitted.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Dietmar reported that the church clean out has been incredible and was thankful for everyone who helped - especially Linda for all her organization and hard work throughout the process. Dietmar also expressed his gratitude to Dan Namet who has been working hard on the renovations of the Associate Pastor's office. He also said that Holy Week was amazing but incredibly hectic between the five services, church clean out, and the groundbreaking/renovation.

Financial Report: The March financial reports were sent out in advance of the meeting and were approved as presented.

Strategic Planning: Pastor Dietmar talked about new member orientation - about 10 people will join on Pentecost Sunday. He also shared there is a small group ministry planned for the fall.

Associate Pastor: Pastor Dietmar shared that the search is in a quiet phase. This means the search committee is working behind the scenes but won't present a candidate to the congregation until one is selected. The process could take the better part of two years.

"Renewing St. Paul's" Renovation Project: Property and Grounds recommended two additional windows for the secretary's office and associate pastor's office at a cost of \$11,520. Stewardship and Finance approved the recommendation, and Council voted to approve the additional cost that will be covered by the Major Repair Fund. The committee also recommended additional concrete work, and it was moved and passed that up to \$15,000 of the contingency money can be used as needed to cover additional contract work. Another motion was approved to spend up to \$1,000 (including installation) for a new residential dishwasher to be added to the kitchen after the major renovation is over.

Spring Clean Out: The final phase of the clean out is Thursday, April 11 at 5:30.

Safety Plan: Sigrid put instruction stickers on the security bars in the Fellowship Hall and Linda reported the AED is still on backorder.

Youth Leader Search: No update.

Nursery Coverage: Still looking for someone to coordinate coverage for the nursery.

Capital Campaign Committee: John Fisher reported that about \$62,000 has been raised of the \$140,000 needed for the renovations with an August 31 deadline. The committee will meet again and continue to contact individuals. A church-wide campaign will also be announced soon.

Christian Ed Committee: Sigrid and Torri reported that in lieu of a traditional week-long VBS this summer, there will be two different VBS family-style days. The first event will be on Saturday, June 8, from 5:00-8:00 p.m. at Jake and Missy McCabes' place. There will be outdoor activities, a cookout, and a campfire! The second event will be on Sunday, July 14, from 12:00-3:00 p.m. at the Rudnitskys' house. There will be water olympics, a picnic, and of course - swimming! Both events will be for the entire family and will include a Bible story/lesson. More information and sign-ups will be posted in May.

Personnel Committee:

- At the recommendation of the Property and Grounds Committee and the Personnel Committee, the Church Council approves changing the title of the "Secretary" position to "Office Manager" and to revise the job description to include "supervision of the custodian" as an added responsibility. The revised title and job description will not impact compensation for the Office Manager position currently; however, the Stewardship & Finance and Personnel Committees chairs, along with Pastor Dietmar will review the position description, complete an annual review of the position, and may make a recommendation to adjust compensation in light of performance and job responsibilities.
- At the recommendation of the Property and Grounds Committee and the Personnel Committee, the Council approves the continuation of the cleaning services agreement with Buddy's Cleaning Services to provide cleaning services as needed. Council further authorizes the Personnel Committee and Property and Grounds Committee to continue to monitor all cleaning services and to empower

the committees to direct the custodian and contracted cleaning services and make necessary adjustments.

At the recommendation of the Music Committee and Personnel Committee, the Council affirms advertising the Senior Choir Director Position. The compensation will be commensurate with candidate qualifications. The council approves extending Amy Caron's current contract through the end of May 2024 to complete a project to digitize choir music. A recommended level of compensation will be advanced by the Personnel, Music, and Stewardship and Finance Committees after carefully reviewing candidate qualifications, budget parameters, and reviewing the compensation of other music positions at St. Paul's.

New Member Orientation: Pastor Dietmar will be holding meetings after worship on April 28, May 5, and May 12. New members will join officially on Pentecost Sunday (May 19).

Summer Worship Time: Sunday services will begin at 10 a.m. from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend.

Communion: May 12 (second Sunday) -Class of '25 - Malcolm Derk (captain), John Fischer, Joanne Lauer, Ellen Miller.

Pastor Vacation: Pastor Dietmar will be on vacation from April 15-22. Rev. Darin Namminga will lead worship on April 21. Next Council Meeting: May 14, 2024 @ 7 p.m.

PASTOR'S REPORT - MARCH 2024

Our St. Paul's Mission is to grow in faith, to worship God, to serve others, and to welcome all.

We continued to connect with the deep meaning of the Biblical stories of Holy Week in our Lenten worship series "Entering the Passion of Jesus." We followed Jesus into his suffering. We connect with and learn from Jesus in and through our own pain and suffering when we become aware of our wounds and brokenness. The decorations for the services were stunning thanks to the Worship Team!

The Spring Cleaning Out of St. Paul's has been a huge undertaking. We uncovered treasures from decades ago. We displayed all items in the Fellowship Hall for members and friends to browse through. We officially decommissioned the items during our Palm Sunday worship service. Most of the items have been put to good use. The Mustard Seed, the Haven Ministries Homeless Shelter, Amish and Mennonite families, and many individuals benefitted from what we did let go. We generated more than \$1,400 toward the Major Repair Fund from people's donations. We have had an amazing group of people helping with the cleaning out, displaying, and repurposing of the items. Linda Turner was a driving force and went above and beyond with the clean out. She did phenomenal! My heartfelt gratitude goes to her and all who made this possible. The cleanout was overdue and necessary to

create office space for our new Associate Pastor. Dan Namet worked for many hours toward this office in our former Music Room taking out a wall, a closet, cabinets and the carpet. Thank you, Dan!

Our Easter Messy Church on March 10 was awesome. The crafts, games, message, music and meal bring families, children, youth, and grownups together to explore faith in fun ways. We have a terrific Messy Church Team and many volunteer helpers who make it happen. I'm deeply grateful for all of them.

Holy Week was amazing! Our Palm Sunday Hosannah Celebration was magnificent. This year the Senior Choir and congregation participated in the Palm Sunday Procession which gave me chills. We could feel Jesus' self-giving love through his foot-washing, communion, and suffering on Maundy Thursday. We joined together with our Selinsgrove Ministerium for the Good Friday Community Service at Sharon Lutheran Church on March 29. We rose for a deeply moving sunrise service starting at the Easter Fire. We joined in a spirit lifting Easter Celebration at 10:30 am with trumpet, organ, piano, choir, duet, and solo music. Following the service, we broke ground for our Renewing St. Paul's renovation project.

St. Paul's music ministry is the best in town. I'm deeply grateful for ALL musicians. They inspire, move, encourage,

WE'RE HIRING A SENIOR CHOIR DIRECTOR


