



I don't like to suffer. I try to evade it at all costs. But I know, in real life, there is no way to avoid it.

Holy Week and Easter are a reminder of that. There is no Easter without Good Friday, no new life without suffering. Jesus was clear about that. Jesus announces to his disciples that he will have to suffer, will be betrayed, unjustly accused, and die.

His disciples, the ones closest to Jesus, try to keep him from suffering. The rock, Simon Peter, is determined to keep Jesus from suffering. But Jesus confronts him. As clear as day, he says, "You will deny me; you will abandon me; I will be suffering; I will be crucified; I will die!" There is no way around it.

Our scriptures describe Jesus as the suffering servant, like a lamb that is to be butchered.

Lent, Holy Week, and Easter are an invitation to become more aware of our suffering and of the suffering of others. It is an invitation to connect us more deeply with Jesus. His path of suffering leads him to the garden where he is wrestling with God. Jesus is clear, "I don't want to

suffer." But he also knows, there is no way around it.

So clear and inevitable is our suffering, that St. Paul says that our suffering adds to Jesus' suffering and completes it. St. Paul was wrestling with "a thorn in his flesh." He prays fervently to be relieved of it. But it does not go away (2 Corinthians 12).

Jacob is wrestling at night with an angel, a demon, God (we don't know exactly who it is), and he is almost overcome by this superhuman force. He is wounded in the wrestling and barely escapes with his life (Genesis 32:22-32).

What is your share of suffering? What is it you are wrestling with? What do you try to avoid, but it does not go away?

I love Jesus because he is so real and realistic. He participates in our suffering, and we participate in his suffering. There is no Easter without Good Friday. There is no new life without suffering and dying. I love the Bible because it is so clear about it. Our suffering is an opportunity to connect us more deeply to Jesus.

I am excited about Easter. It is the

amazing celebration of new life, of rising with Christ from our suffering to new life. As the sun rises after the darkness of the night, so do we with Jesus. God raises us to new life.

We emerge from the pandemic, from cocoon and tomb. We "hatch" like a butterfly, grow wings, and take flight. The butterfly has been a symbol of transformation and resurrection for ages. God raises us to new life. But it does not happen in the absence of suffering, darkness, and brokenness. When you look at pictures of the risen Christ, he is often pictured with his wound marks.

I don't like to suffer. I try to evade it at any cost. Yet, in real life, there is no way to avoid it. It is in and through the suffering that we are raised to a new life.

I want to experience that more deeply this year. Both the inevitable suffering and the resurrection life. I invite you to join me on this journey.

ST. PAUL'S COUNCIL MEETING MARCH 8, 2022

Because of the timing of the newsletter publication, these newsletter minutes are not the official, approved minutes. After the minutes have been approved at the next meeting, the final minutes are available upon request.

Attendance: Sara Adams, Kim Burkhart, Amy Caron, Bob Engel, Peggy Peeler, Pastor Dietmar Plajer, Sigrid Plajer as guest, Shane Sanders, Craig Stark, Randy Tanner, Linda Turner, Allen Wetzel, Mike Zettlemoyer.

Excused: Bev Heinemann, Kathy Ulrich, Josh Wenrich.

Minutes from February Council: Minutes were sent earlier via email by Randy Tanner, no changes were noted. A motion to approve the minutes was made by Linda Turner, seconded by Bob Engel, and the motion was approved.

Financial Report: The report was sent earlier via email. Linda Turner highlighted some of the figures outlined. A motion to approve the financial report was made by Randy Tanner and seconded by Kim Burkhart. The motion was approved. Pastor's Report: Pastor Dietmar sent out his report earlier via email. He expanded briefly on the items in his report to Council.

Unfinished Business & New Business Worship Service: Pastor Dietmar spoke with Council about changing our current mask protocol. He noted the recent decline in new cases of Covid reported and much positive discussion ensued among Council. A unanimous decision was made to make changes to St Paul's mask policy effective Sunday, March 13. The sanctuary main level will be a mask optional area and singing is encouraged. The upper-level area will be a safe zone with masks required and singing not allowed. Our choirs, ensembles, and oth-

ers performing are to use their judgment and leave the majority of those in said groups to make their own mask decision. Overall, feedback continues to be positive regarding all our worship opportunities: in person, online, and phone-in. **Family Sponsorship:** Further inquiry into sponsoring a displaced Afghan family is no longer necessary as all the families being housed in temporary quarters have been placed. Hallelujah!

Community Opportunities: With Pastor Dietmar's sabbatical rapidly approaching, a consensus was fielded to put this project on hold until after he returns.

St. Paul's Vision: Pastor Dietmar mentioned how important it is for us to discern St. Paul's vision for the future post Covid. He will contact our UCC Penn Central Conference to access their staff for support on moving forward with vision building.

Sabbatical Pastor: Pastor Dietmar explained the need for a job description for a sabbatical fill in minister in light of the length of time (three months). A motion to adopt the suggested position description was made by Linda Turner and seconded by Kim Burkhart. The motion was approved. Pastor Dietmar had spoken with Rev. Darin Namminga about his interest/availability to take on the job. Rev. Namminga is interested and has the availability to perform the job with a concern about the current pay for fill-in pastor. Pastor Dietmar agrees that pay needs to be updated to a more current rate for the position. A motion was made by Shane Sanders to increase the pay rate for the fill-in pastor/Sabbatical pastor to \$8,000 for the total of three months, as recommended by the Stewardship and Finance Committee. The motion was seconded by Sara Adams and was approved.

COUNCIL MINUTES CONTINUED

2022 Lenten Worship Series: Pastor Dietmar shared his thoughts and resources, including a favorite book of his, for deciding on this year's series. The series encourages us to follow Jesus' Lenten journey, following him through his darker, harder times and challenges.

Personnel Committee Report: Status quo continues in their search for the ongoing open positions and, with regret, the Office Manager position. Our Office Manager, Sue Nentwig, submitted her resignation. With regret, Council accepted her resignation. A motion was made by Bob Engel and seconded by Craig Stark. The motion was approved. A motion to authorize the Personnel Committee to update the office manager position description and advertise the position was made by Bob Engel and seconded by Randy Tanner. The motion was approved.

Messy Church is fast approaching on Sunday March 13 with "Celebrating Small" - Parable of the Mustard Seed being the topic.

The Sunday school class with Lois Bruno/Marty Blessing has embarked on a Lenten devotional series entitled "The Long Haul". Initial input from the class is very positive. Thursday Evening Group: The current series on race relations and becoming antiracist through diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) has one more week of study left.

Kids Group & Children's Sunday School continue with Torri Stark and Linda Turner and many volunteers assisting in leading the children.

Vacation Bible School: It is planned for June 6-10 entitled "ReNew". The Living into Right Relations/The Green Team is asked to support the VBS project about helping the earth with recycling and renewal.

Confirmation Group: The class will be ending with the Confirmation service on Pentecost Sunday on June 5.

Visitation Ministry Coordinator: The

search continues for the position, and anyone interested in visiting/calling on our homebound members, please let Pastor Dietmar know.

Day of Remembrance Essay Contest: St. Paul's raised \$1000 for one of the prizes awarded to the students. The winning essays will be shared with St. Paul's in the future.

Church Council Vacancy: Ivana Lluveras submitted her resignation from church Council. Ivana regrets leaving her position, but ongoing health concerns don't allow her to continue. This creates a short-term vacancy on Church Council as Ivana's term expires December 2022. Vacation: Pastor Dietmar will be on vacation March 18-20. A motion was made to approve Pastor Dietmar's vacation by Linda Turner and seconded by Sara Adams. The motion was approved. Rev. Darrin Namminga will fill in for worship during Pastor Dietmar's vacation.

Committee Reports:

Property and Grounds: They are seeking bids for replacement of the Mill St. door remote entry system and ongoing exploration of alternative avenues in the replacement of the furnace. They are also looking to repair/replace concrete work in the exterior stairwells.

Green Team & LRR Group: A Zoom planning meeting has been scheduled for March 15 at 7pm for those interested in assisting the planning of PFLAG Selinsgrove. The group will be participating in VBS June 6-10, projects are being formed on Renewal/ Recycling. They are also exploring to connect with the Community Garden.

Finance: The committee had made a recommendation of re-investing \$35,000 currently in the checking account. This amount is above the ongoing balance carried in our checking. Re-investment would allow us to gain dividends on the extra money as opposed to no dividend on checking accounts. A motion was made by Randy Tanner to act on the Finance Committee's recommendation
